Dear Beloved Community,

I continue to give thanks for your work in being peace-makers and bridge-builders in the name of Jesus.

In January, we enjoyed a lively interfaith dialogue and rich discussion with Rabbi Mark Cohn from Temple Emmanuel in Winston-Salem. We learned about differences within Orthodox and Reformed Judaism, how Jews understand who is Jesus, how Jews look at and interpret scripture. I thank the Board of Evangelism of their hard work in making this a success. The next interfaith dialogue will be **Sunday, March 11**th with Father Constantine Shepherd of Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church of Winston-Salem.

I am pleased that on **January 15th** we had six FRUCCer's travel to First Baptist, Village Drive for the Community Martin Luther King, Jr. worship celebration. The sanctuary was standing room only, and Rev. Dr. Arnetta Beverly preached a powerful sermon calling us to serve one another and to be drum majors for justice and peace.

The Community Meal held on January 23rd was a wonderful outreach. Over 125 people were served and approximately \$300 was donated to Hospice.

In February, we finish up our "Risky Business" worship series. We have looked in Mark's gospel at ways that Jesus put himself in harm's way and took risks for love and justice. What are we willing to risk so that others may know the love of Jesus?

Lent begins on **Ash Wednesday**, **February 14th**. The congregations of St. Stephens UMC and Second Reformed UCC will join together at **6:30pm in our sanctuary** for worship and the Imposition of Ashes. Dr. Beverly from St. Stephens will bring the message. If you cannot attend this evening service, I hope you will attend the NOON Community service at First Lutheran Church uptown.

During the 40 days of Lent, we seek to repent, which in

Greek literally means "turn around." In worship we will explore ways for us to "turn around" from the distractions of daily noise and focus our attention on listening in a deeper way. Writer Parker Palmer suggests we must listen "to what our *life* is telling us." In other words, to listen to the deep wisdom God gave to us as a birthright, connecting to God's purpose once again. This Lent we will quiet things down and heighten our attention to the "still, small voice" of God and our own True Self.

I hope you will participate in the weekly Lenten Bible study at FRUCC that begins **Tuesday February 20th** from Noon-1pm. I look forward to our discussions with the good people at St. Stephens UMC, Shadyside Presbyterian, and Second Reformed UCC.

We are undergoing a discernment process titled "Building an Inclusive Church" (BAIC) to study what it means to be an Open and Affirming Congregation within the UCC. This process is about education, prayer, healthy discussion and graceful engagement about publicly welcoming people in the LGBT community. The BAIC process is officially recognized in several mainline denominations. Although this may be an uncomfortable discussion for some of us, I wholeheartedly believe this congregation will emerge stronger and clearer in mission as we wrestle and discern together. I care

deeply about you, and I ask that you please let me know if you want to talk individually about your specific questions. More information on the process and upcoming schedule is found on **page 9.**

This congregation is touching the lives of so many – both on Sunday mornings and throughout the week ,as well. I pray God's blessings upon each of you and on this congregation as we listen for God's direction.

Board of Worship: Deanna Michael (No report)

Board of Evangelism: Dave Fulton...Boston Butt sale raised \$1,172. Catawba Singers set for March 18, 2018.

Old Business:

Consistory Retreat is tentatively set for February 17, 2018 at Yarbrough's Restaurant 10:00–2:00.

Personnel Report: Lindsay Sink...Discussed reorganizing committee to allow for more consistent transition from one year to next. Goal is to create a consistent review plan of every staff person.

New Business:

By-Law change: Present at Congregational Meeting on February 11, 2018 to amend the By-Laws for changing the Congregational Meeting date in November (page 4, section 4) to second Sunday in November. Currently it is set for the first Sunday, but this regularly interferes with homecoming.

Long Range Planning Committee: **Lindsay Sink**...Committee was initially set up with members being Lindsay Sink, Clifton Murphy, John Gray, Walter Hoffman and Buddy Lohr, but it is open to any church member who desires to participate. Denise Durham indicated a wiliness to serve. The committee will be planning a method to meet goals of the church and Pastor Horton to move into a full time position. Additional plans will include discussion about where we want to be as a Church in 2, 5 and 10 years.

Church Security Committee: **Lindsay Sink**...Committee was formed to discuss security in the Sanctuary during worship hours. Lindsay has met with Fire Dept. and Police Dept. officials and the committee will be reviewing and implementing their recommendations which include an exterior camera located outside the front door. The door will be locked at 11:10 and the back and side doors will be locked at all times during the service.

Home Communion: Volunteers will serve communion to the homebound.

Committee Calendars: Stressed to committee chairs that calendars be set February, 2018 through January 2019 to ensure continuity of working positions into the new year.

Pew Removal: Approved pews to be moved for handicap accessibility in sanctuary.

The next meeting is scheduled for February 11 after the congregational meal and meeting.




