Happy New Year!

Will you be one of the ones to stay up until midnight on New Year's Eve --- not to usher in 2021, but to make sure that 2020 finds its way out the door? Many of us anticipate what this new year will bring...that 2021 will be different...will be better... will once again be normal.

I want to believe this, really, I do, but I cannot help but ask the questions...What if it's not better?...What if 2021 is EVEN worse?... What if the road ahead of us is actually scarier than the road we have just traveled?"

As we approach Epiphany on January 3rd -- when the Magi follow the star to the manger giving gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh -- we will be reminded that the Holy Family faced this very kind of situation:

After the harrowing circumstances at Jesus' birth, Mary and Joseph faced an even graver risk posed by King Herod. So envious and threatened by the attention the Christ Child received, he feared his own power and privilege would be usurped. Herod sought to kill the Baby Jesus and decreed for the execution of all male children under two years of age in the area of Bethlehem.

To protect the life of their son, Mary and Joseph faced the unknown road of fleeing for their lives, as refugees running from violence into a foreign country, the road ahead indeed more dangerous than the road they had once traveled.

Due to its graphic nature, I typically don't preach on this passage, known as the Massacre of the Innocents in Matthew 2. Yet, it is an essential part of the Birth Narrative, showing us the world into which Jesus was born, filled with violence, injustice, greed and tragedy. A world in which we find ourselves today.

And so, standing on the precipice of 2021 let us decide to listen to God's call no matter what the year brings.

Let us covenant together

to bring peace into the midst of hostility, to love our neighbors and our enemies, to bring joy in the midst of sorrow and to keep hope alive...
no matter what 2021 brings in.

Like the Magi of long ago, let us follow the Star wherever it may lead.



FOLLOW ME Adult Bible Study begins on January 10, 2021 at 9:45AM. The season of Epiphany is about seeing the light that is Jesus the Christ breaking forth into the world in which we live. Seeing is only the first step, however. We don't see the light of Christ the same way we see the beauty of the Grand Canyon, for example, or a particularly beautiful sunset. While there is beauty in the presence of Christ, it is a beauty that calls forth a response. There are many ways to respond to the presence of Christ. In this series, we focus on the invitation to follow. It is an ongoing process to follow Jesus; a transformation that continues through every stage of our lives.



Concerns of the Future

- Setting up committees for each board
 - ♦ Suggestions for Board Chairpersons beginning 2021:
 - ◆ should start looking at committees of their board and assign chairperson for 2021 by January. Encouraged board chairs to meet with committees regularly in the future.
 - ◆ Assess committees to determine if they match church mission. Rev. Horton asked for reflections from the consistory to determine strengths/weaknesses in our processes. Determine if there is a need to restructure boards and committees to match where we are at present. Look at the past, before and during Covid restrictions. Kivi Miller mentioned boards tend to cross over in their responsibilities. It's not clear who is in charge of some and some share the same tasks.
- Jerry Lovell requested permission to spread Clothes Closet out into adjacent classrooms.

Melt crayons to show how the body of Christ works together.



- Crayons
- Metal baking sheet
- Adult help
- Metal gingerbread man cookie cutter

What you do:

- 1. Remove labels and break crayons into 1-inch pieces.
- 2. Scatter pieces on the baking sheet, about two layers thick.
- 3. Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees until melted. Allow to cool 15 minutes.
- 4. When melted crayons are the consistency of playdough, press the cookie cutter through them (while still on pan).
- 5. Cool the pan in freezer for 15 minutes until crayons are hardened.
- 6. Remove from pan and break apart the shapes.

RELIVING THE PAST

As First Reformed United Church of Christ's 120th Anniversary approaches on January 17, 2021, here's an article, written by Mrs. Paul Lopp, from the Seventy-Fifth Anniversary Edition of The Dispatch — Lexington, NC you might enjoy seeing. The article was sent to Rev. Horton from Steve Smith.

The Dispatch - Lexington, N. C. Seventy-Fifth Anniversary Edition

Reformed Church Held First Service On January 20, 1901

Davidson County has many Reformed churches which date to the eighteenth nineteenth centuries, but there was not one in the town of Lexington until the beginning of the nresent century. Rev. Jacob Cal-on Leonard. D. D., was notified in July, 1900, that he was commissioned by the Board of Home Missions Missions of the Reformed Church to organize a church in Lexington, his work to begin on October first.

Seeing the urgent need, Dr. Leonard began to work in July. He purchased a lot and on October 4, 1900, laid the first brick for a church building. The structure, built of brick with a slate roof, was practically finished in January, when the following in-vitation was sent out. "You are cordially invited to attend divine services in connection with the opening of the First Reformed Church, corner of Center and Salisbury Lexington streets. North Carolina, at 11 o'clock a. m., and 7 p. m., January twentieth, nineteen hundred and one." The church, which seated 300, was filled with worshippers both morning and evening.

Immediately following morning service, the congregation was organized. There were twenty-two charter members: Mr. and Mrs. C. Columbus Burk-Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Dupree Burkhart. Clodfelter, Clodfelter. Charles L. Everhart, Mrs. Robert Heitman, Mrs. David Hinkle, Mrs. Early H. Hounes, Mrs. J. F. L. Tus-sey, Mr. and Mrs. J. Tilden Hedsey, Mr. and Mrs. J. Tilden neu-rick, Mr. and Mrs. P. James Leonard, Mrs. Charles L. Rhodes, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin A. Rothrock, Miss Ada Rothrock, Mrs. Samuel Rothrock, Mrs. Amanda B. Sowers, and Mrs. Joseph H. Sowers, P. J. Leon-ard, E. A. Rothrock, and C. C. Burkhart were elected elders, and J. A. Hedrick, C. L. Everand Dupree Clodfelter,

The first parsonage was built in the fall of 1901, next to the church, on Center Street. It was occupied in January, 1902, by the paster and his bride, who was Miss Willie Cress. Mrs. Leonard immediately found her place in the work of the shurch, centering her interest on children. She still serves as super-intendent of the Beginner-Primary Department of the Sunday



DEDICATED IN APRIL, 1928, this is the sanctuary of First Reformed Church in Lexington. Men on the building committee were J. Tilden Hedrick, Griff W. Smith, Helland A. Sheaf, D. Lee Brinkley and Walter A. Conrad. In all of its 58-year history, First Reformed has had just three pastors: Rev. Jacob Calvin Leonard, Sr., Rev. Banks Peeter and Rev. Marlin Schaeffer. (Dispatch

Leonard served as pastor of both, mg was dedicated. First and Second Reformed Churches until 1922, when Rev. A. Odell Leonard, first ministerial son of First Church, became pastor of the Second Church

Church.

By 1907, First Reformed Church had outgrown its house of worship. An enlargement to the rear added about a third to the seating capacity. In 1912, then seating capacity. In Tilden Hedrick. Superintendent of the Sunday School, proposed to the congre-gation that he would build and donate a Sunday School building

The lot back of the Sunday School building was gives to the church by Elder J. Tilden Hedrick in 1919. During the next year, Mr. Hedrick equipped the space with playground appara-tus for the use of the children of the community. When the lot was needed later for building operations, the equipment was given to Second Church, where it is still being used.
