Advent 2021: Close to Home

When something hits us "close to home," we feel it deeply. Throughout this year, collectively we have felt much suffering and sorrow. As we approach Christmas, many carry tremendous pain and grief, missing loved ones lost. The traumas of the pandemic are still with us. Many do not feel safe in their own homes due to poor living conditions or harmful family dynamics. Many feel alone and isolated at home. We all long for God to come close to us.

This year, journey with us in worship as we take steps to move closer to the home God envisions for us -- a home filled with hope, peace, love and joy.

We journey through Luke's Gospel, where the stories are tender and heavy with emotion:

• John the Baptist prophesies about the One who is to come, but reminds us we are still wandering far from God's promised day;

- After receiving the angel's news, Mary retreats to Elizabeth's home, to seek refuge and safety.
- Emmanuel, God with us, comes into the world through a scandalous couple who is told there is no room for them.

In these scriptures, home is something we seek **and** something we are called to build. Ultimately, God is our home and resting place. With the birth of Jesus, God draws near and makes a home on earth.

This Advent...

- May we be comforted by the One who dwells intimately with us.
- May we expand safety and sanctuary for everyone wandering far from home.
- May we find our home in God, wherever it may be — to live fully with joy, hope, and courage.

Are we there yet? No. But with God's help, we can get closer everyday.

As we head into the Christmas season, it is hard to turn on a television without seeing a commercial or movie about the joy of sharing the happy holiday spirit. This spirit of joy and goodwill happens every month with the Clothing Ministry here at First Reformed.

We receive "lists" from our neighbors in need about items of clothing they could use, and we continue to **fill about 100 orders a month**! None of these requests could be met without the donations of our First Reformed UCC family and the community.

We work with other churches to provide for our members of our community who are less fortunate than ourselves. Like always, it's about more than just pants or shoes or coats. Filling the clothing orders is only a part of what this ministry is about. Volunteers and those being served share a bond of time and energy, creating a special sense of friendship, almost like family. This happens every Monday, Wednesday and Friday when Macedonia Methodist serves free breakfasts at St. Stephen Methodist and every Saturday when First Reformed serves free lunches and every Sunday when Grace Episcopal serves a free noon meal.

The faces become familiar, and you can feel the love and appreciation between the

volunteers and these special friends. This spirit of goodwill and caring means so very much to those who may feel forgotten and seldom get a smile or words spoken kindly to them. The gratitude for a meal or a much-needed coat is very evident. Food and clothing can't fix everything, though.

We can see the hurt of a parent who can't provide for their child. We can sense the desperation of someone who feels there is nowhere else to turn. Showing respect for people regardless of their situation is so very important in the food and clothing ministries. For these folks, volunteers can offer an ear to listen, give a pat on the back, or supply tissues to dry tears. Doing simple things such as that, offer hope and love like we would offer to a friend or family member.

Our volunteers live every part of First Reformed's Welcoming Statement. We meet our neighbors where they are in life. We work to share joy in their good times (like getting a job) or help carry their sorrow in a bad situation (like losing a grandparent). We hope to make the world, at least our part of it, a better place.

• The next scheduled meeting will be **December 5.**


CARDS FOR OUR MEMBERS AT HOME & IN CARE FACILITIES
