Cuts, Curls, and Chow Event

On July 15, The Clothing Ministry of First Reformed was involved in possibly the biggest community event in our history!

We joined in with 17 organizations offering services and information to some of the less fortunate in the area.

Free haircuts and shaves along with shower trucks were onsite at the Salvation Army, where the new shelter will be located. Breakfast and lunch were provided for everyone who attended. Seventeen tents were set up to provide information about resources that are available and may not be widely known. There was an estimated two hundred people making use of the services and learning about programs; plus, there were about one hundred volunteers onsite.

First Reformed Clothing Ministry's involvement actually began a week before, during our Saturday Free Lunch Program. We opened the basement for customers to shop that day as well as on Monday morning and evening in conjunction with meal times at St. Stephen. We opened again on Wednesday during breakfast time, during the regular Thursday afternoon workday, and finally on Friday morning... the day of the event. By offering all these times, those who wanted to do so, could shop for themselves. Over five hundred pieces of clothing were distributed!

The churches and organizations involved in "Curls, Cuts, and Chow" were pleased overall with the event. We recognized a few areas that need improvement for next year; early, and more, advertising of the event along with collaborating more closely with the county transportation buses.

If you would like to volunteer with the Clothes Ministry, please contact Jerry Lovell. This is a growing and much needed ministry in our community.

Women's Fellowship... July 27, 2022

Women's Fellowship met again at Yarborough's Restaurant on Wednesday, July 27 at 11:30. There were eleven ladies in attendance, but we missed several due to illness or other conflicts. As the meeting began, Belinda Yates shared a thank you note for the donation Women's Fellowship made to benefit the outreach programs of The Davidson County Lodge #97 of the Fraternal Order of Police.

Cathy Waitman shared devotions with us titled "I Missed Your Hug," which reminded us all of how much encouragement and building up we can receive through human contact, and how incomplete the lack of this left us feeling when we were restricted from human touch during Covid. (We celebrated this freedom today by joining hands during the blessing for our meal.)

Belinda Yates gave a treasurer's report, which showed additional donations made since our June meeting. It was noted that fund-raising opportunities have been limited since Covid began. Paula Lopp, president, led our discussion to the next agenda item: opportunities for fund-raising.

Fund-raising ideas included:

November/January soup sale – plans to make 75 quarts of soup for sale on November 13. We could also include any baked items or other food items or crafts anyone would like to contribute for our fund-raiser. We'd also plan another soup sale in January, increasing the number of quarts for sale, if the November sale does well.

Collecting "offering" at our monthly meetings – Rita Lohr reported this was a way the Morning Glory Circle helped to keep money in their treasury when they were still meeting. Quite a few members donated during today's meeting. This is something we can continue each month.

Rada Cutlery Sale – This is something the Morning Glory Circle always did around November/December. Rita will gather information on this to share at our next meeting. This was usually a good fund-raising event for the circle.

Happy Homes baking flavorings – This was suggested by Harriette Murphy. Glenyce Fulton and Carolyn Robbins remember this being sold by a Sunday school class at 2nd UCC. Harriette volunteered to check into this for the next meeting.

Paula revisited the idea of the October Pumpkin-carving activity we used to hold each year, usually along with a hotdog supper. It was agreed this was a good activity to bring back for 2022, but instead of a hotdog supper, we considered refreshments. This is something Women's Life Fellowship always did for kids and families or anyone who wanted to attend. We would like to get permission from Consistory at their August meeting before we proceed with planning. Rita will take this information to the meeting for discussion.

Glenyce Fulton reported that Amanda Fulton bought Cheerwine & snacks using some of the money we donated to the youth work camp. She will also purchase ice cream for the youth.

Paula also asked for nominees for President and Secretary. No nominees were suggested, but asked for Paula and Carolyn to continue. Paula said we will revisit this again at our September meeting, since that is the month we usually elect new officers.

Rita Lohr agreed to share devotions with us at our August meeting which will be at 11:30 on August 24th, again at Yarborough's Restaurant. Any women in our congregation are welcome to join us for good food and fellowship and a chance to get involved in our activities. You don't have to let anyone know in advance...just come meet us at the restaurant.
